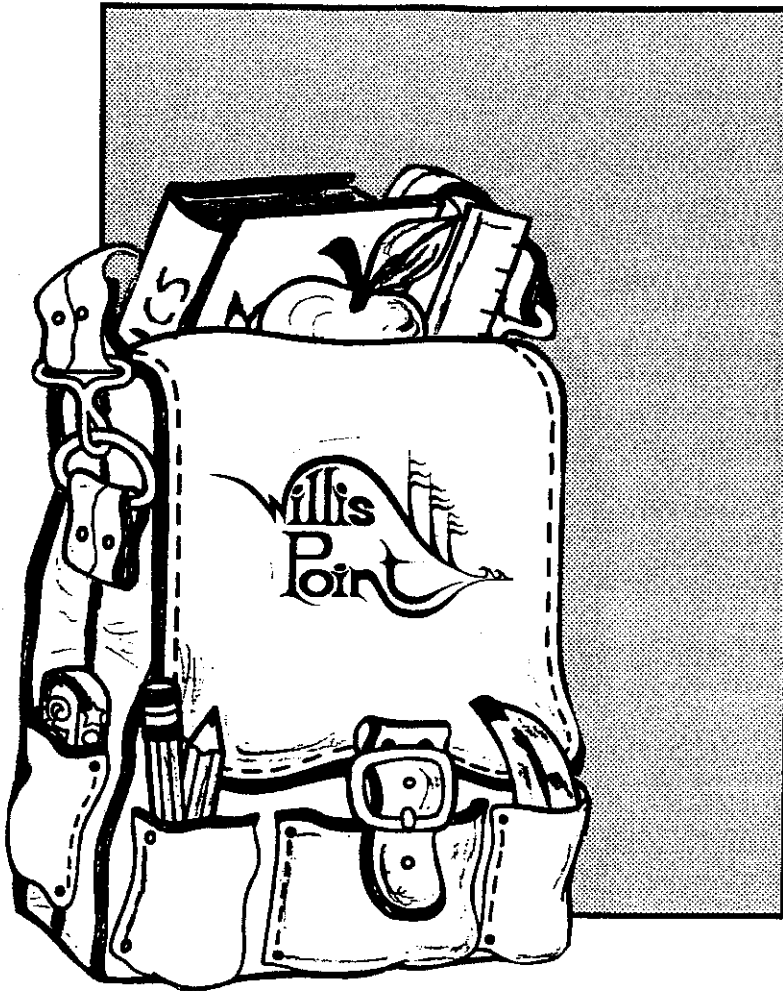

ED BLUNT WILLIS POINT MEMORIAL

FAMILY MEMBERS AND FRIENDS OF ED BLUNT

I have been asked by Ivy Blunt, Ed's wonderful wife, to say a few words about Ed and his love for this very beautiful and friendly community. To say a few words about Ed is very difficult, because anyone who knew him, knows that you could talk for hours about the kind of person he was and all the wonderful contributions he made to his family, his friends and the community of Willis Point.

Although I have only known Ed for a brief span of his life and mine - about eight years, I can say only that he was one of the finest men I have ever known. He was friendly, complimentary, hard working, with a great love and respect for family and community.

Ed and Ivy were among the very early pioneers of Willis Point. They camped on the Point with their young family in the 50's and traveled by boat from Brentwood to camp in the vicinity of their old home. Eventually they bought a piece of property, built on it in the early sixties, and raised their young family here at the Point, while Ed commuted to his barber shop in downtown Victoria.

Ed loved Willis Point. He loved it so much he created a sense of belonging for his entire family. Today his children, Ken and Bill, both own property at the Point. His grandchildren all live nearby and visit regularly. He brought Ivy's Mom to the Point where she lived in her own place for many years. In the late sixties he brought his sister-in-law, Lillian, and her husband, George Pears to the Point. Ed was a friend of and to the community. He was one of the original founders of the Willis Point Volunteer Fire Department. He was one of the people responsible for building the Community Hall, and organizing the Strawberry Tea, the original fund raiser that preceded our current Annual Hilltopper on Father's Day of every year. As long as Ed could attend and find a job to do, he always was available to help out, whether it was building the Hall, parking cars or caddying for Ivy ... and he always did it cheerfully. Ed was a cheerful and positive person and that I think that was his biggest asset. He always had something good to say. He looked on the bright side of things. He did not complain about himself. Even when he was going through his last ordeal with his dreaded illness, he never complained for himself, but

only for those who he felt he was a burden to. He loved the Point. Even in the past year, when he no longer had the use of his legs, he would sit, watching the activities on the water - the boats, which he loved so much, the birds in the air and on the water. He visited with his family, playing cards with Ken and Bill, and the grandchildren ... and talking to Ivy. He was good to his friends and invited them to visit and stay as best as he could manage it. He was a good friend. And he had savvy ... I love that expression! Ed taught it to me. Whenever there was a problem, he said it just takes savvy to work it out. Ed had more savvy than most people, yet he was always ready to credit it to someone else. He taught savvy by instilling confidence in people for the things they had to do. It is a good quality. Savvy ... knowing what to do when you have to do it. Ed had it. He knew people. I guess it was from all those years of barbering ... listening to people, learning. He was a good listener. He made people feel good about themselves. He was a good man.
We will miss you, Ed! God Bless!



Unfortunately, Brenda's interest in breeding Welsh Terriers, required more space and she and John moved to Ladysmith. As we recall Brenda's bubbling personality and marvelous sense of humour, the following recipe comes from her kitchen. We miss you, Brenda.
PatCracknell

CREAM PUFFS OR CHOCOLATE ECLAIRS
from the kitchen of Brenda Olmstead

Preheat oven to 375 degrees.

Combine in a saucepan

1/2 cup butter or margarine

1 cup boiling water

Bring to a boil.

Brenda's way - put butter and boiling water in an 8oz glass measuring cup. Microwave approximately three minutes or until boiling. It does not take long.

Add all at once

1 cup all purpose flour

1/4 tsp. salt

Beat with electric hand mixer until mixture leaves the sides of the measuring cup. Cool slightly.

Then add, one at a time

4 unbeaten eggs

Beat until smooth after adding each egg, then beat until glossy.

For Cream Puffs:

Drop batter from a spoon onto greased baking sheets, mounding each and swirling the top. Space at least two inches apart. Bake for thirty to forty minutes, or until light and dry.

Fill with flavoured whipped cream or a cream filling. Dust with icing sugar. Serve chilled. Yield: eighteen medium cream puffs.

For Eclairs:

Shape on greased baking sheet into strips which are approximately three to four inches long and one inch wide. Bake for 45 to 50 minutes or until golden and dry. Cool away from drafts. Split and fill with whipped cream or cream filling or ice cream. Top with Chocolate Glaze.

Chocolate Glaze:

Melt (in microwave of course) one square unsweetened chocolate and one tablespoon of hot milk (heated in the microwave of course). Spread the warm glaze over the eclairs and allow to cool.

PARK PLANNING

an update

Following the announcement of the new provincial park for the Gowlland Range and Tod Inlet, the Willis Point Community Association asked me to represent Willis Point when the government got around to developing a formal plan for the park.

David Chater, who is the Malahat District Manager of the Ministry of Environment, Land and Parks, told me on August 25 that planning for the park had not started yet, but that he expected that by late September or early October the Ministry would put together an advisory planning team to help his ministry develop a park plan.

The advisory committee would have at least one member from Willis Point. In total the committee would have fourteen people or so, including representatives from various user groups (i.e.. mountain bikers).

Clearly, the Willis Point representative(s) should reflect the will of the community, so it is my feeling that Willis Point should have its own, small working committee that takes input from Willis Pointers in general and funnels that input to the park advisory committee representatives(s).

I have talked to a few people this summer about volunteering for this committee, and if anyone is

interested in being part of the park planning process, please let me know. Once I know more about the actual mandate and schedule of the advisory committee, I expect to call a public meeting so people in Willis Point can come together to talk about what they would like to see in the park plan.

In a sense there are really three sections to the park: The Gowlland Range, Tod Inlet and Partridge Hills. The forest and meadows protected in Partridge Hills provide Willis Point with a mini wilderness at our back door. Some of the best scenic locations, however, in the Partridge Hills were not included in the park, which is frustrating. The park extends across Willis Point Road to MacKenzie Bight, and this section has some fine natural features. The scenic values in and around Tod Inlet are protected, but some of the ridge looking down on Tod Inlet from Partridge Hills remains in FAMA hands.

Since Willis Point is more or less surrounded by park land, what we need to do is come up with a vision of our community that takes full advantage of the green space around us.


