Don Lovo
1929 – 2006

It is with great sadness that we bid goodbye to our friend and neighbour, Don Lovo, who passed away on May 29.

Don had an enormous energy and employed it well. He leaves a legacy of accomplishments that span the globe. Dedicated to the sport of archery for more than 30 years, Don was an athlete, coach, instructor, judge, and executive, and taught sport development seminars in more than 50 countries. He formulated the archery judging standards now in use around the world and served on the board of the Canadian Olympic Association and as an Olympic judge. In reward for his great work, Don was made a member of the Alberta and Canada Sports Halls of Fame.

Humanitarian causes were close to Don's heart as well. He was committed to the many programs of the Rotary Club and whole-heartedly involved in aid to the poor in his beloved Cuba, making many trips there with donations of clothing and necessities cajoled from friends and businesses. In a life of service he wore many hats including that of the first professional scuba diver in Alberta, drum major of the Princess Patricia Light Infantry, and a pilot who flew his own plane.

Most importantly, here at home, Don was a devoted family man, friend and neighbour. He and Lois were married for 42 years, raised Don's four children and opened their arms to a host of grandchildren who made them both so proud. Don and Lois came to Willis Point many years ago and Don especially enjoyed the boating and fishing and pitching in to help the community. And he loved his cats.

Once introduced, Don never forgot a name. He loved visiting his neighbours and building things in his well-equipped workshop with his amazing collection of tools for wood and metal working. We will always remember his cheery wave from the big Suburban or seeing him pulled over at the side of the road chatting with a neighbour. Our sympathy goes out to Lois and the family.

WPCA Minutes Summary

The following are summaries of the major points discussed, NOT complete minutes. Complete minutes are posted on the bulletin boards or can be obtained from the Recording Secretary.

April 10, 2006

- Insurance coverage for social events at the Hall will be covered by Municipal Insurance Association Group for %650 per year, giving us \$2 million coverage with no liquor exclusion and covers the hosts and liquor licensee.
- Commercial quarrying at Hartland will not take place but aggregate will continue to be produced.
- Septic guidelines are being developed by the CRD and the Province of BC.
- Letter sent from Patrick O'Rourke to Ida Chung regarding our desire to be included in any deliberations on future governance of Willis Point and amalgamation options.
- FAMA is preparing a proposal to present to the community.
- Discussion of the closure of a road allowance on Dave Lawrie's land. The APC approved closure with the provision of a pedestrian easement along the border of the property connecting with the old path and Mark Lane. Land Use Committee was advised and referred the matter back to CRD and Dept of Highways. FAMA representative Frank Edgell said FAMA opposed closing the right of way as they would like to access possible future homes on Lot 42 from there and will present a proposal that would include that land in a trade for some land near the Fire Hall. Much discussion on this complicated issue.
- Geri Gorling will chair the nominating committee for the elections to be held at the AGM in the fall. Chair, Treasurer, Recording & Corresponding Secretary needed.
- Emergency Services would like a member of the Fire Department to represent Willis Point at their meetings.
- concerns about the possible plans to bridge the Saanich Inlet and the lack government solicitation of input from local areas such as Willis Point. Correction Notice: the website for information on this issue is <http://www.th.gov.bc.ca/malahat/index.htm>

May 8, 2006

- new insurance for social events at the Hall is in place, paid by Fire & Rec Commission. A lease agreement for the WPCA is being developed.
- discussion on the need for fundraising activities and ideas for future events.

JUAN DE FUCA LAND USE COMMITTEE

WILLIS POINT REPRESENTATIVE

POINTER REPORT– June 2006

The Juan de Fuca Land Use Committee held four meetings since my March 2006 Pointer Report –March 21, April 4, May 2 and May 16, 2006. The next scheduled meeting is June 6 – the time and location have not been confirmed at time of writing.

Summaries of these meetings are in my April and June reports to the Community Association, and posted on the bulletin boards. The Committee dealt with one Willis Point application, as well as recommendations from a Willis Point resident to amend the Development Permit Approval By-law. The Committee agreed with one of the amendments, which clarifies who must receive notice of certain land use applications.

The Willis Point application was to close an old road right of way on a new lot to be created from parts of two existing lots. The Ministry of Transportation makes the decision, but the CRD is asked for views. The proposal was heard by the Land Use Committee in February, referred to the Advisory Planning Commission, then heard again in April. The neighbouring lot owner, FAMA, opposed the proposal on the basis that it lowered their property's value. The Land Use Committee decided it was a "commercial" issue between the two owners, and voted to send the application to the Ministry of Transportation without comment. The CRD Board subsequently adopted this motion. The Ministry of Transportation will now make a decision.

Earlier this year there was a legal challenge to the Official Community Plans for East Sooke, Otter Point and Shirley/Jordan River. The Capital Regional District decided to send these OCPs back through the approval process, and this is now in progress. More detail on this issue can be found in the electronic newsletter of the Juan de Fuca Electoral Area Director. The legal issue that arose with these other OCPs does not apply in the case of the Willis Point OPC and its validity is not affected.

Other items: Metchosin recently joined the Land Use Committee (Bob Graminga is the Metchosin member). The Committee adopted guidelines for the content of geotechnical reports submitted with a Development Permit or subdivision application. Anyone considering such an application should ensure their geotechnical expert is aware of these guidelines. The Committee recommended adoption of a new soil removal bylaw, which gives local residents more input into major soil removal (quarrying).

I would be pleased to answer any questions, provide copies of reports and applications, or discuss any land use matters.

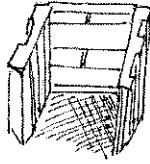

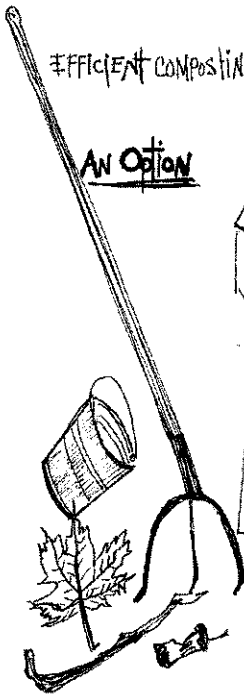

- FIRST LAYER: ground + water

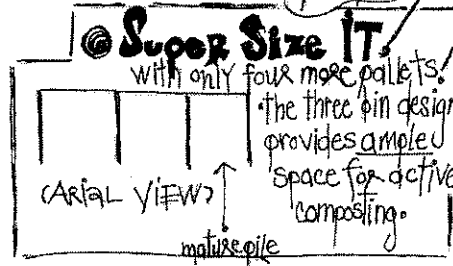
* REPEAT and ALTERNATE: third and fourth layers until HEAP REACHES 3-5 FEET in ELEVATION

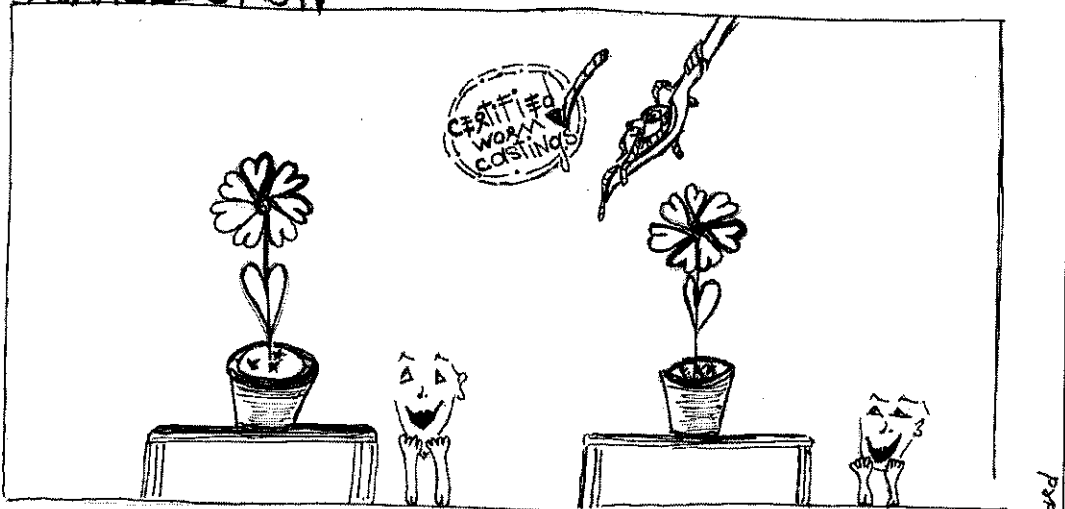

Nine Months Aboard Salacia

Aloha! I'm writing this update from the Hawaii Yacht Club in Honolulu, on Oahu. As I look around the boat, I see sights that I find familiar: a sandy beach, swaying palm trees and sailboats in a harbour. Surprisingly, I also see dozens of high rise hotels and apartments, a major shopping centre with a rooftop revolving restaurant, and vehicles stuck in traffic on a bridge. As we haven't been in a modern city for nine months now, it's strange to have so many eating, drinking, shopping and entertainment options within walking distance. I have come to appreciate finding one palapa restaurant or a small corner store on shore. The choices here are overwhelming!

Salacia has traveled many miles since our last Pointer update. Most significantly, we sailed 3002 nautical miles from Puerto Vallarta, Mexico to Hilo, Hawaii. We had a fast passage across the Pacific Ocean – 19 days – but it was a challenging one due to high wind speeds and rough seas throughout most of the trip.

We are proud to have completed our first major ocean crossing, but we had not expected it to be so difficult. For twenty-four hours per day, one person must always be on watch, sailing the boat and looking out for other boats (although we only saw three on the whole passage). Sleep was hard to come by, due to the rolly motion we experienced in high winds and confused seas. We had a couple days of smooth sailing in sunshine and steady winds, but frequently we headed into rain squall after rain squall.

The constant motion on the boat was uncomfortable. It was difficult to cook proper meals so we lived on snack foods like Pop Tarts and granola bars. I wished that we'd brought more fresh fruit and more chocolate! Although we didn't eat well, we were thankful that neither of us became seasick.

With little sleep, the twenty-four hour days felt long on this tough voyage. Everyday, we charted how many miles we'd completed and how many more we had to go. We looked forward to satellite weather updates and emails from friends and family, radio check-ins with other cruisers, and watching episodes of "Friends" on our laptop computer. We read when it was calm and spent many hours with our own thoughts while staring at the big open ocean. It's an incredible experience to be a tiny dot in the middle of the majestic ocean.



I'll never forget the excitement of seeing lush green land ahead on the morning of our 19th day at sea. After making landfall in Hilo on the Island of Hawaii, it was an amazing feeling to set foot on land. On shore, we enjoyed a group of cruisers who had made the same voyage or a similar one from the South Pacific; everyone had interesting and very different stories to tell.

Fortunately, the boat fared well and the crew simply needed recovery time after the passage. After some heavy sleep, we rented a car and drove around the Big Island. This Island has it all! We hiked in the dense jungle and were misted by waterfalls spraying into the ocean. We drove to the summit of Mauna Kea, which has snow on its peak, even in May. A walk over a lava desert allowed us to view an active volcano. We liked having a couple nights in a hotel and the convenience of a car. However, after some repairs and restocking of the boat, we were ready to discover the Islands by water.

Our sail around the Big Island was unforgettable. We sailed close to the shoreline to view the active volcano at night. The red-orange glow of the lava flowing into the ocean was truly spectacular. We anchored in a couple picture perfect anchorages, with white sandy beaches and turquoise blue waters. Snorkeling was good and spinner dolphins often did acrobatics around the boat. When we went walking on shore, we found trees dripping with fresh fruit and tropical flowers perfuming the air. In many ways, sailing around Hawaii seemed idyllic.

Unfortunately, we found boating conditions in Hawaii to be very poor. There are very few marinas and even fewer transient slips available in marinas. Mooring buoys aren't maintained: friends incurred serious damage to their boat when their mooring buoy broke and their boat crashed into the shore. We found Port Captains, charter boat skippers and other boaters to be helpful, but locals gave us the message that our boat was not welcome. This attitude was a great contrast to the reception we grew accustomed to in Mexico.

Moreover, the wind and sea conditions in the Hawaiian Islands proved to be a challenge. We had to wait for nearly a week to cross the channel between Hawaii and Maui due to high waves and winds. After only one trip to shore at Lahaina on Maui, we were stuck on the boat due to weather conditions. The dinghy trip from our mooring buoy to shore was just too rough and wet so we headed to the Island of Lanai.

The small private island of Lanai was a welcome break for us. Fortunately, we found an empty slip in a very friendly marina. We rented a 4WD Jeep and toured the Island's rutted dirt roads, beautiful empty beaches and historical sights. A visit to the Fire Department was a highlight for Mark. We really enjoyed the relaxing, slow pace of life on this lovely island.

We had another exciting sail in high winds and big waves as we headed from Lanai to Oahu. We enjoyed this passage though as we knew it would be our last sail for well over a month. We've hired a professional skipper and crew to sail Salacia home for us. This will give us time to visit family and friends in June before we spend July and August cruising familiar B.C. waters.

For the end of May and early June, the friendly and convenient Hawaii Yacht Club will be our home. We're looking forward to a visit from our friends, Kelly and Robbie, who will join us for some sightseeing around Oahu.

It will be a strange feeling to step off the boat, our home for nearly ten months, and head to the airport. However, we're excited about seeing the people we care about at home. We can't wait to get back to the Point so we'll be waving at you on Mark Lane very soon!

Thanks for your interest in our adventure. We look forward to hearing about what you've been doing over the past year. Enjoy a wonderful Willis Point summer, dear neighbours!
